Access to data: The state of play

- Focus of presentation on both microdata censuses/surveys/registers - and macrodata - NGO/NSI outputs
- I will *not* be covering realtime data, nor commercial/customer tracking databases. And just a single mention of point-to-point data
- I will *not* be focusing on issues of comparability these problems are taken as read!
- I will focus on re-use of data for commercial purposes
- Aim to inform 'Where we are now'
 - Hilary to shed some light on one future development!





Microdata sources

- Censuses
 - IPUMS-I
- Surveys
 - Eurostat
 - CESSDA portal
 - ESDS International
 - Guide to freely available data
 - Cross-national research resource





Macrodata sources

- ESDS International maintains a pretty exhaustive guide at http://www.esds.ac.uk/international/resources/guide.asp#freedata
- Largely, provision of data at country level





Microdata records with detailed geographies attached

- Will exists to maximise use of census data, including commercial access – see excellent overview by Denise Lievesley
- In practice, limited access to census microdata for non-scientific use!
 - But note for UK: Non-academic access to <u>SARs</u> and <u>Longitudinal Study</u>
- Survey data more liberal access regimes but coarse geographical detail
 - UK example: commercial users have access to EUL (GOR, NUTS1) but not 'Special Licence' (NUTS2-5) data





Fine-grained macrodata sources?

NGOs

- Free online access to <u>Eurostat</u> (selection of data to NUTS2/3; point-to-point transport data)
- Other freely available data via: e.g. undata
- Others mainly by subscription: e.g. SourceOECD

NSIs

- UK: Neighbourhood Statistics, NOMIS (labour market); Census
- Patchy (subject coverage, level of geographical detail) across other European NSIs but worth taking a look at each NSI, e.g. Austria
- N.b. difficulty in putting together a Europe-wide or multi-nation dataset





Key messages

- Limits to geographical detail available cross-national, cross-regional comparisons much easier to make than, e.g., ward-level comparisons
- Access restrictions/delays/charges for commercial use need to be considered
- Finding/accessing European data at fine geographical detail – sadly, there is no golden bullet!





What is CESSDA?

- Council of European Social Science Data Archives
- Currently, informal group of 20 member archives
- Goal: to facilitate pan-European data discovery & sharing





The CESSDA ERI: a legal entity to the promote access to European SSH data

- Central co-ordinating body for SSH data resources
- Governance Structure
- Sustainable funding
- Contractual agreements with service providers
- In 2007, 20 members jointly held over 25000 datasets









CESSDA mission

- Provide better, enhanced knowledge of and access to wider range of social science data
 - Improve researcher/learner experience
 - Enable quality research / training
- Maximise stakeholder investment
- Enhance transfer of skills, knowledge









Functions of the centre

- Development and maintenance of quality data collections (central and virtual) through the identification of gaps/needs and brokering data access agreements
- Providing a lobbying and representative role, with central funders and other key stakeholders
- And many more....









Survey results - 1

2008 survey of members provided limited information about availability of Census data.

Of 10 organisations:

- 6 distribute Census data
- 4 distribute administrative registers









Survey results - 2

Of 17 responding organisations:

- 76.5% distribute demographic & population data
- 41.2% distribute transport, travel & mobility data
- 35.3% (of 17) distribute housing, land use & planning data







Progress to date

- Discussions with:
 - European funding agencies, to support national archives and promote data sharing
 - DG Research in support of their policy for sharing EU funded SSH research data and related outputs – CESSDA may provide a dissemination support service
 - Eurostat and NSI's about better access to official data, including confidential data









Next steps

Upcoming FP7 call (provisional information):

- Time: Summer 2009

Scale: Millions of euro

- Goal: Collaboration between CESSDA and Eurostat/NSI's
- Possible proposal for pilot project on feasibility of a European SAS – early stages of discussion with ESRC Census co-ordinator
